MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Aloha, Members and Friends of Taishoji,



It is already June! It has been 1 year and 7 months since I came to Hawaii. Time goes by so quickly. We have to cherish the moment. I would like to share with you about 利行 *(Rigyo)* which means:

"Beneficial Deeds." I talked about it at the last UHSSWA conference.

Beneficial Deeds, similar to Aloha, is to act to others with compassion without expecting anything in return. Dogen Zenji the founder of Soto Zen School said, everyone should always be ready and willing to help people in trouble. I think that the important part of the teaching is not to expect anything in return. Do you usually act to others with compassion without expecting anything in return? It might be a difficult task for many of us.

For example, if you cook something or wash some clothes for your husband or your child and they don't appreciate your deeds, you might be angry at them. As a human being, to expect something in return is obvious. But Dogen Zenji said, we should not expect anything in return. How should we go about doing that?

I would like to talk about different ways of how to expect nothing in return. Please imagine that you are getting hungry as you moved your body dancing the hula. You are starving! But you are smart. You have a Spam Musubi! However, Rev. Hata appears before you and is looking at your musubi hungrily! You noticed that and gave him half of your musubi as you are a giving person. He ate the musubi, but left without an expression of gratitude. At this point, you might be angry at him and think that "I was also starving and wanted to eat the whole musubi! What a rude man! After that, you might be in a bad mood all day.

But let us consider how you would feel if you were not starving, but was full? If you was full and gave your musubi away, even if it wasn't appreciated, you would not be angry at him as you would already be full. So, the point is, if you are filled with happiness and love, you are able to act with compassion without expecting anything in return.

We have to be happy ourselves in order to make other people happy.

Are you filled with happiness? Happiness is not something to obtain but something deeper.

When we were a baby, we couldn't do anything. We grew up supported by our parents, relatives and so on. Nobody gave them money or said thank you in return.

So we have lived by acting with compassion not expecting anything in return. We are already a happy person at that point in time.

That's why, we should actively act to others with compassion whether we are being thanked by someone or not.

It is similar to returning the favor for all the love and care someone has given us. Any time, anywhere, let us practice *Rigyo* with happiness and love! Thank you very much.

Zen Practice

In Zen Buddhism we do not learn only from a book or teacher, but from life, and we do not learn only at the temple, but from everywhere. Zen is experience itself, the truth of life as it is ever flowing by.

The way of Zen is not a withdrawal from life, but is found in all the activities of everyday life. The fusion of everyday life is a central theme of the Soto school of Zen, according to the founder Dogen Zenji.

This is why Zen developed the cultivation of arts, such as tea ceremony, flower arrangement, bonsai, poetry and painting. Even in the field of martial arts like judo, karate, and aikido. The first supporters of Zen in Japan were the samurai, the warrior class, who found in Zen an emphasis on self-control and equanimity of mind, a discipline conducive to their own end.

The principle in these different applications of Zen is that any field of activity can serve as the means for realizing the truth of Zen.

The hope of Buddhism is to develop a peaceful mind, a peaceful life and an awareness of relationships between oneself and others.

EMPEROR ASHOKA: WHO WAS HE?

In the Third Century B.C. E., Emperor Ashoka was ruling the vast Maurya Empire in India. He had taken the throne in a bloody war and was a ruthless leader with many violent triumphs to his credit. But during the eighth year of his rule, after a particularly gruesome battle, Ashoka became shaken by his own bloodbath --- upward of 100,000 people are said to have been slaughtered --- and it set the stage for a powerful change.

Emperor Ashoka became a Buddhist and was largely responsible for the spread of Buddhism beyond India's borders and its emergence as one of the world's great religions. He practiced tolerance and respect for other religious disciplines, promoted peace instead of war, and established schools, hospitals, and orphanages for his people. He was living proof that it is possible to rule a great nation with kindness and open-mindedness, promoting peace and goodwill. This is the start of Gnosticism, that Western civilization is so fascinated with today.
