

I perform Zazen with assistant Deacon Juho Kirkpatrick every Monday. On July 10th, I was really surprised. The participants filled the zazen room. Joy filled my heart! On that day, 18 members participated in our zazen. The visiting training monk, Rev. Yogetsu Akasaka also participated. I invited my friends in my English class to join me in our zazen session. In addition, the people who participate regularly are also increasing. I was so glad to sit in zazen with them. We sit in zazen ourselves, but we can encourage each other in our practice of zazen.

Have you ever done zazen? Have you heard that zazen is good for our brain? I spoke about the positive relationship between zazen and the brain.

According to a research at Harvard University, by sitting in meditation, our hippocampus increases. We can increase the powers of our concentration and perhaps prevent dementia. In addition, by sitting in zazen, without thinking about

anxiety of the past or the future, you will be able to direct your focus to now. If you can calm down by zazen, you can control your angry mind and react to others with compassion. Buddha, Dogen Zenji, Keizan Zenji and many disciples improved their lives through zazen.

Do you want to get along with others? Do you want to interact with others with compassion? If you want to be like that, I strongly recommend zazen. I hope that you love zazen and spend your life with a zazen mindset. We can also do zazen sitting in a chair. I'm looking forward to having you participate in our zazen sessions! In Gassho.

Taishoji Soto Mission Zen Buddhist Lay Confirmation Ceremony

"Jukai-e"

The Lay Confirmation Ceremony is a ceremony in which Taishoji members formally receive the sixteen precepts of the Buddha and firmly commit themselves as Buddhists.

According to the Soto Zen tradition, lay confirmation ceremony is the most important ceremony in the life of a person.

Therefore, through this ceremony you will formally become a disciple of the Buddha. Dogen Zenji, the founder of Soto Zen Buddhism said, "Should beings receive the Buddha's precepts, they enter the realm of Buddhahood. The are truly disciples of the Buddha."

Date: November

Place: Taishoji Soto Mission

Purpose:

To give members of Taishoji Soto Mission the opportunity:
☐ To receive the sixteen precepts which are the moral & ethical foundation of our tradition.
☐ To deepen one's understanding of the Dharma.
□To receive a Buddhist name.
□ To provide spiritual confirmation within the Sangha in the presence of family & friends.
☐ To allow those who have already received the precepts an opportunity to renew their commitment to this sacred path.

Requirements

- ☐ Member must be age 15 or older (permission of parent required if a minor)
- ☐ Member will study materials on fundamental Buddhist teachings and on the 16 precepts that are prepared by the minister.

Member will be invited, but not required, to attend zazen sessions whenever possible.

□Donation/Dana to the temple: \$100 suggested donation to Taishoji Soto Mission on the day of the ceremony. No person will be denied the opportunity due to financial hardship.

Receive

- □ Wagesa: a sacred collar worn as a symbol of your commitment to Buddha's teachings, to be worn at all services.
- ☐ Materials for Study: Basic Buddhism, Soto Zen
- □ A Buddhist name: a positive description of your qualities or of the moral virtues that you may nourish and cherish as you walk in the path of Buddhahood.

- Day 1: Short service, zazen and study workshop of Jukai-e
- Day 2: Short service, zazen and study workshop of Basic Buddhism
- Day 3: Short service, zazen and study workshop of Soto Zen School
- Day 4: Short service, zazen and workshop of Taishoji Buddhist service, rehearsal for Jukai-e
- Day 5: Short service, zazen and rehearsal for Jukai-e
- Day 6: Jukai-e Ceremony

If you have already received your Buddhist name, you may renew your vows.

THE PARABLE OF THE ARROW

From one of the Pali sutras:

One day, after the afternoon meditation, a monk came to the Buddha, greeted him, and then asked him some questions that were bothering him. Namely, is the universe eternal or not, is the universe finite or infinite, is the soul one thing and the body another, or is the soul and the body the same, does the Buddha exist after death, These and other similar questions were asked.

In reply the Buddha gave this story; O monk, Suppose a man is wounded by a poison arrow, and his friends and relatives called in a skilled physician. Suppose the man should then say "I will not let this arrow be taken out until I know who shot me; whether he is of the warrior caste, or the priestly caste, or the trading caste, or the low caste; what his name and family may be; whether he is tall, short, or of medium stature; whether his complexion is black, brown, or golden; from which village or town he comes. I will not let this arrow be taken out until i know the kind of bow with which I was shot; the kind of bowstring used; the type of arrow and from what kind of material the point of the arrow was made."

O monk, that man would die without knowing any of these things. Therefore, O monk, bear in mind what I have explained as explained, and what I have not explained as unexplained. Why have I not explained those questions you ask?

Because they are not useful, not connected with the spiritual holy life, not conducive to detachment, cessation, tranquility, realization, or enlightenment.

What have I explained? I have explained suffering, the arising of suffering, the cessation of suffering, and the path leading to the cessation of suffering.

Years ago, while working on Johnston Atoll, the Christian Chaplin asked me what is the Buddhist idea of how the world began. Because he told me that god made the world. So I told him this story.
