#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Aloha, Members and Friends of Taishoji,

I had a really good time at the beginning of June! We welcomed Rev. Shinryu Akita from Japan to Taishoji and held the Baika workshop. Nine Baika members, participated in his workshop from June 1 to 7. Baika literally means 'Plum Flower' in Japanese. Baika is a form of Japanese Buddhist music consisting of short poems of praise sung to the accompaniment of hand bells. Baika is easier to understand than a Sutra. Baika songs have a sweet melody.

At the end of May, Baika held its 65th Anniversary celebration in Fukui prefecture, Japan. One Baika member from Taishoji went to Japan to attend the 65th Anniversary convention.

We can easily understand Buddhist teachings by listening to and by singing Baika. For example, the following is the translation of the Kanzeon Bosatsu Gowasan. It is one of the Rev. Shinsho Hata Baika songs. "Kannon always envelops us in a warm hug with her compassion. Kannon

showers us equally with her affection. Kannon is like our mother. We take refuge in Kannon." I was able to realize the greatness of Kannon since I started Baika. If you can understand the meaning of the song, you can realize the greatness of the song. All the Baika songs are in Japanese so we read the English translation together before we sing the songs at our Baika practice. By doing so, we can understand the meaning of what we are singing. Also, Baika is not performed as a solo. We sing Baika as a team. In this way we can deepen our mutual bonds with each other. As we sing together, we can share with all members a sense of accomplishment. I would like you all to know the greatness of chanting, the enjoyment of listening to the songs and the fun of learning Buddhism.

#### **BASICS**

From our green book; "The ignorant have themselves as their greatest enemy, for they do evil deeds which bear bitter fruit. "In this case bitter fruit means suffering. That is worry, tension, anxiety, and stress.

This is nothing but the basic Buddhist philosophy of karma. That is, that all of our actions have results. Whatever we say or do has consequences. If we say or do unwholesome things, trouble will come to us, very simple. And we all know this, because we know if we rob the corner store, or shoot someone, we will be in big trouble. We know also that if we study, get degrees from school, or learn a trade, that we can get a good job.

We know karma on a large scale. Most of us avoid big problems. The principle of karma also works on a small scale. I have seen that many people have small problems in their lives. Perhaps a little too much selfishness or greed. Perhaps telling small lies or stories that cause problems. Thinking about things in a wrong manner also causes us headaches. We have to realize that we cause most of our problems.

One thing for sure, is that there is no escape from our actions. Christians can pray to god for forgiveness, but Buddhists always reap the rewards of their actions. There is no escape.

When we can see and understand karma in our daily lives, we can adjust our behavior, allowing us to live a more happy and peaceful life.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS

Our Sunday School term starts on September 10 at 9 a.m. Enjoy learning about our Zen Buddhist Religion from the sermons of Rev. Shinsho Hata, the beautiful songs and gathas in our Gatha Book, The words of our Sunday School teachers, and the uplifting organ music of Mrs. Mamiko Hata.

## **BUSSHIN KAI NEWS**

Our Soto Zen Buddhism religion is founded on the logical ideas of Shakyamuni Buddha, who lived and died over 2,500 years ago. He was a human being, just like you and me. There was nothing miraculous about his birth. His mother died 7 seven days after giving birth. But he gave us the great ideas of the Four Noble Truths and the Eightfold Path. These are well-thought-out plans for anyone to have a happy life on earth.

Shakyamuni's ideas were later corrupted by the influence of the polytheistic religion of the Greek civilization brought by the conqueror called Alexander the Great about 300 years after Shakyamuni's time. Tibet had its own native religion called Bon, which was animistic and mystical. When Buddhism spread out from the Ganges River basin to the northwestern India, Tibet and China, it adopted some of the Greek and Tibetan beliefs. Thus, it produced the huge division of Buddhism called Mahayana Buddhism and its Buddha statues that stand up and the faces are Caucasian-looking. These statues have both shoulders covered up, while the Theravada Buddhists, the other big half of Buddhism, have the right shoulder bare, and the Buddha is sitting in lotus-style.

The bon dance festivals that Taishoji follows come from the old Tibetan Bon religion with its mystical tales and legends and unique designs on small hand drums. The influence of the Mahayana Buddhists is seen in the images of bodhisattvas, such as Kannon-Sama, and Jizo-San, to which followers offer prayers for mercy and protection. But these "ta-riki" (other power / divine power) Images are never found together with the Shakyamuni Buddha (the Historical Buddha). They are found in adjoining rooms or outside the temple. Thus, here at Taishoji, we offer incense at 5 different religious stations every month.
