MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Aloha, Members and Friends of Taishoji,

New banners of the Soto Zen School in Hawaii! As one of the Hawaii Soto Mission Association projects, these banners were completed by Rev. Jiko Nakade (Daifukuji) and Rev. Myoshin Kaniumoe (Alaneo Zendo) last month. These banners will hang on the wall at all the Soto Zen temples in Hawaii. Actually, I also helped with this project and drew these Chinese characters at their request. Precious Buddhist teachings are written on these banners. "Giving", "Kind Speech", "Good Deeds" and "Empathy", these teachings are called the "four kinds of wisdom" or "The four Integrative Methods of Bodhisattvas." Each banner has three different translations in Japanese, English and Hawaiian. We made these banners so people can become aware of precious Soto Zen teachings.



I'd like to talk about one of these teachings, Giving. Giving is called Dāna in Sanskrit, which means voluntary giving of material, energy, or wisdom to others. These characters are called Fuse(布施) in Japanese. The character of "布(Fu)" means cloth. The other character means to Give. Fuse originally came from the story in which a poor person gave a dirty cloth to a monk in return for the monk's sermon since this poor person didn't have money and any kind of food. The monk sewed his robe using the dirty cloth without wasting it.

There are various ways of giving. In our daily life, we have the opportunity to give in many situations. However, we have to consider how we feel when we give something to others. Buddha and Dogen emphasized that "Giving is non-attachment."

There is a Buddhist story which I'd like to tell all of you. About 2600 years ago, there was a disciple of the Buddha called Shariputra. One day, Shariputra received a lot of food from people in town since he gave a sermon to them. After he went home, he felt that it was a shame to eat it all by himself. Shariputra decided to give the meal to Buddha, since Shariputra knew the importance of giving and respected Buddha. Shariputra went to Buddha. Then he said, "I came here to give this food to lord Buddha!" Buddha said "Thank you very much for bringing this food. Continued on next page

"Buddha accepted the food. Then, Buddha gave the food to a dog beside him. Shariputra was really surprised and said. "Why did Buddha give the food to the dog? I brought the food for Buddha!" Buddha said to Shariputra, "Which is the true practice of Giving, your behavior or my behavior? Giving is non-attachment. Non-attachment is to share things which you have with compassion, and even after you share the things, you should not think about wanting those things anymore."

Finally, Shariputra realized his mistake and reflected on his behavior. In this story, I thought that Buddha's behavior was a little mean. But Buddha wanted to teach Shariputra the importance of giving. Giving is non-attachment. At first, since Shariputra wasn't attached to the food, Shariputra could give the food to Buddha with compassion. But since Shariputra intended to give the food to only Buddha, Shariputra was angry at Buddha's behavior.

If I was Shariputra, I might also be angry at Buddha. However, Shariputra should not have been angry at Buddha. Because Giving is non-attachment. The same thing applies in our daily life. We tend to give something to only the person who we like or to give something expecting something in return. But if the person wasted what we gave or didn't do anything in return for our acting, we might be angry or think that it was a waste. This is not the true practice of giving. To give material, energy, or wisdom to others freely is the true practice of giving. Every time you see the Banner, please remember the importance of Giving. Giving is to just give what we have to others with compassion.

The Kyodan Installation and Shinnen Enkai was held in February. Congratulations to the incoming officers of the various organizations. Let us work together to have another successful and exciting year.


Please make a correction in the Board of Directors list in the February Hakuho. The Fujin Kai President is **Mrs. Yoko Gussman.**

HANAMATSURI (FLOWER FESTIVAL)

Sunday, April 8, 2018 at 9:30 am, the Taishoji Kyodan will be hosting our HANAMATSURI / KANNON KO / TOBA KUYO SERVICE. We will be celebrating Shakyamuni Buddha's birthday. He was born more than 2,500 years ago to King Siddhartha and Queen Maya in the garden of Lumbini in Kapilavastu, a small kingdom in the Himalayan foothills. He was called Siddhartha and later, Shakyamuni Buddha.

It has long been said that at the time of his birth Shakyamuni Buddha said, "Heaven, Earth and I are one person." At each temple through out Japan, a small pavilion, covering a statue of the baby Buddha pointing one index finger toward heaven and the other toward earth, is set up and decorated with flowers. This statue is bathed with sweet tea and this is the way Flower Festivals are observed.

as a general, public event. Let us believe in the true happiness brought about by Shakyamuni Buddha's teaching and celebrate the unsurpassable joy it gives. Sweet tea is essential of the Flower Festival. According to the legend, two Dragon Kings rained warm and cold sweet water from heaven to bathe Buddha. Not only is sweet tea drunk at the Flower Festival, but there is also the custom of grinding *sumi ink* with it and writing "April 8th is a day of good fortune and insects are driven away." The piece of paper this is written on is hung upside down and thought to keep away disagreeable insects.
